



 - Meeting Satisfactory Academic Progress
- Financial Aid Trust Grant
 - Similar to the University Grant, but funding is limited and awarded based on when a student's FAFSA is submitted.
- Access2Excellence
 - Covers undergraduate tuition charges for fall and spring for Arizona residents with a household income up to \$65,000. Students who are members of Arizona's 22 federally recognized tribes also automatically qualify
