A message from our **SUPERINTENDENT**

I am grateful to all the students, families, and educators who have helped get the beginning of the 2024-2025 school year off to a great start. As we close the first month of school, I want to take a moment to share information about the importance of regular school attendance.

Every day matters. Chronic absenteeism, missing 10% or more of a student's enrolled days for any reason (excused absences, unexcused absences, and suspensions), can have a significant impact on student learning and success. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, schools have seen a concerning rise in chronic absenteeism nationwide. A student missing 2-3 days of school each month can lead to chronic absenteeism.

When students miss school regularly, they risk falling behind academically. This can lead to difficulties in reading, achieving in middle school, and even graduating from high school. But the problem

BOC Tours Coconino High School's Mini Auditorium Construction Project

August 1, 2024

On July 2, 2024, members of the Flagstaff Unified School District's (FUSD) Budget Oversight Committee (BOC) and governing board members toured the ongoing construction at Coconino High School (CHS), specifically the remodel of the school's mini auditorium and the surrounding outdoor plaza.

During the tour, Superintendent Michael Penca expressed his enthusiasm for the project's progress, emphasizing its significant upgrades and the positive impact it will have on the school community. "The committee toured the

construction sites of the remodeled auditorium and plaza at Coconino High School," Penca said during his report to the FUSD Governing Board on August 13. "There's an outdoor plaza that could be a gathering space, and we addressed the drainage issues that have plagued that area. So, I think all of us are really impressed with that project and, again, really grateful for our

partners."

Penca explained that the partners involved in the renovation include the DLR Group as the architectural and engineering design team and CORE Construction as the general contractor. The design features large stone slabs that create a welcoming outdoor space and address previous drainage problems at the site. Inside the auditorium, the renovations have transformed the space into a professional-grade theater. The interior design incorporates the school's black and red colors, with new seats installed and substantial upgrades to the audio-visual equipment.

Superintendent Penca praised the enhancements.

"It's really well done, and a huge upgrade to the technology and audio-visual equipment," he said. "I can't wait to hear some of our talented students read poetry in there, sing, do stand-up comedy, whatever our kids decide to do in this wonderful space."

The mini auditorium project was initiated after the FUSD Governing Board approved a construction contract with CORE Construction in December 2023, totaling \$3,075,447. The project broke ground in January 2024 and is slated for completion by the fall. Funding for the project primarily comes from the 2018 and 2022 bond dollars, with additional contributions from district funds allocated through Medicaid, Capital, and Adjacent Ways.

In addition to the mini auditorium, the construction includes site upgrades designed to enhance safety, accessibility, and functionality. These upgrades extend to the South Commons area, site drainage near the south parking lot, and improvements along the Izabel Street frontage.

FUSD is also utilizing funds from the 2022 Bond, passed in November 2022, to support a variety of campus-specific projects. As part of these efforts, additional exterior improvements to the entryway of Coconino High School will be completed in tandem with the mini auditorium renovation.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the completion of the new mini auditorium is tentatively scheduled for September 6, 2024. More information about the event will be released as the date approaches. **4**





Flagstaff High Senior Inspires Team with New Helmets Amid Adversity

We are proud to share the inspiring story of Stephen "Budda" Dick, a senior at Flagstaff High School, who has demonstrated extraordinary courage, generosity, and selflessness in the face of adversity. Diagnosed with Stage Three Anaplastic Astrocytoma brain cancer in 2023, Stephen's high school football journey was interrupted by his health struggles. After experiencing a seizure during practice in the Flagstaff High School weight room, Stephen underwent medical evaluations that led to this lifechanging diagnosis.

Despite the daunting challenge before him, Stephen's spirit remained strong. His teammates, too, showed their unwavering support when they drove to Phoenix to visit him in the hospital, presenting him with a signed poster—a heartfelt gesture from the Flagstaff Eagles Football team.

When the opportunity came for Stephen's family to apply for a wish through Make-A-Wish Arizona, Stephen's humble nature shone through. Believing that others needed a wish more than he did, Stephen chose to use his wish not for himself but for his football team. In a stunning act of generosity, he decided to support his teammates by securing 55 custom Riddell helmets designed to provide enhanced protection and safety for the Eagles.

The special presentation of these helmets took place on August 3, 2024, at Flagstaff High School's auditorium. Surrounded by his family, teammates, and representatives from Make-A-Wish Arizona, Stephen's contribution was celebrated with admiration. Former Arizona Cardinals star Larry Fitzgerald even sent a personal message via video, praising Stephen's incredible selflessness and the strength he embodies.

Stephen's act of kindness did not go unnoticed by the Flagstaff community. His bravery and determination have touched many hearts, showcasing the profound impact of compassion and unity. Not only have Stephen's efforts provided physical safety for his team, but they have also created a lasting legacy of perseverance and love for his community.

FUSD Breaks Ground on New Marshall Magnet Elementary School

August 8, 2024

On August 5, 2024, the Flagstaff Unified School District (FUSD) marked a historic moment for the community with the groundbreaking ceremony of the new Marshall Magnet Elementary School. The ceremony, held at the lower field of the former Flagstaff Middle School site, symbolized the start of construction on a state-ofthe-art facility that will serve the students of Marshall Elementary for generations to come.

The event brought together parents, students, staff, and community members to celebrate Marshall Elementary's new beginning. The school has been a cornerstone of the community since its original construction in 1952. The ceremony featured remarks from Marshall Elementary School Principal Janelle Reasor and FUSD Superintendent Michael Penca, followed by a community barbecue that fostered a sense of excitement and camaraderie as the new chapter for the school began.

Standing on the sacred land that has long been home to educational institutions, Principal Janelle Reasor shared her vision for the future.

"Today is an absolute honor and a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to stand before you on this sacred land to explain the unique design of our new school that captures Marshall's rich history while supporting the learning environment of our 21stcentury scholars," she said.

Reasor highlighted the school's evolution from its foundation in 1952 to its transformation into an art and science magnet school in 2000, emphasizing Marshall's deep roots in the Flagstaff community.

"As we break ground today, we carry with us the torch of our rich history, preserving many artifacts and valued traditions that have made Marshall a cornerstone of our community for 72 years," Reasor said, reflecting a sense of pride in the past while looking forward to the future. "This new facility will be a beacon of learning for the generations ahead."

Reasor went on to detail the unique design of the new school, which will integrate the diverse landscapes of Arizona as part of its "Trek of the West" theme.

"Our pre-kindergarten and Kindergarten students will begin their journey in the Sonoran Desert. As they progress through their elementary years, our school design captures the biomes as they increase in elevation," she explained. "Students will journey through the Labyrinth Canyon, experiencing the Great Basin, High Chaparral, Havasupai Falls, the Mogollon Rim, and end their 5th-grade journey at the highest elevation of the Tundra biome—our sacred Humphreys Peak."

The new building's design has been meticulously crafted to ensure that the school remains a safe, flexible, and community-centered space for innovative learning. Reasor expressed her gratitude to the community and to the partners who have made this new chapter possible.

"The DLR design team and CORE Construction teams have been phenomenal partners throughout this journey," she said. "They have exceeded our expectations in every way."

The construction of the new Marshall Elementary School is funded through the Proposition 448 Bond, approved by voters in November 2022. This bond allocated \$25 million of its \$100 million total to the replacement, rebuild, and relocation of Marshall Elementary. It is a necessary investment to bring the school up to modern standards and better serve its students, particularly in its magnet and special education programs. The new site at the former Flagstaff Middle School addresses key safety concerns and provides ample space for the school's future.

Superintendent Michael Penca echoed Reasor's sentiments in his address to the gathered crowd.

"This is a momentous occasion for our district, and I am incredibly grateful for the opportunity to share this milestone with our students, families, staff, elected officials, and community partners," Penca said, expressing his appreciation for the community's support and leadership in making this project a reality. "Thanks to the overwhelming support of our voters in the 2022 bond election, we are able to make this dream a tangible reality."

Penca also acknowledged the collective efforts of the FUSD Governing Board and the Bond Oversight Committee, whose leadership and guidance have been critical throughout the planning and design process.

"To CORE Construction and all your trade partners, we commend your commitment to excellence and safety as you embark on this exciting project, and we look forward to watching your progress until the new school opens next Fall," he said.

The ceremony concluded with the ceremonial turning of the soil, marking the official start of construction for the new Marshall Magnet Elementary School, slated to open in October 2025. The event served as a powerful reminder of the community's commitment to education and to the future of Flagstaff's students.

"Together, we are building a brighter future for our students," Penca concluded.

The spirit of optimism and progress was palpable as the community came together to celebrate the groundbreaking of a new era for Marshall Magnet Elementary School—a school that will continue to foster a love of learning and creativity for generations to come. **4**

"Finding out that there were

so many applicants that had been nominated this year... I was completely blown away and so excited to take on this opportunity," she added.

"I am extremely humbled to take on this opportunity and ready to showcase what I believe in as an educator and how I can support education and make changes, especially in Flagstaff and beyond in our state of Arizona," she said.

Project Momentum Training Inspires FUSD Educators

August 16, 2024

On Friday, August 2, 2024, Flagstaff Unified School District (FUSD) hosted its first Project Momentum training, marking the district's commitment to improving student outcomes through enhanced professional development and teacher collaboration. Dr. Dan Mulligan, a national expert in instructional strategies, led the day, which aimed to provide FUSD teachers with valuable tools to increase their effectiveness in the classroom while reducing workload.

"Dr. Mulligan's job was to improve teacher effectiveness and decrease their workload," said Superintendent Michael Penca. "He gave them tools that they could edit and make better."

To support this effort, Dr. Mulligan created an extensive online resource for teachers, which includes over 500 instructional resources to aid classroom teaching. Penca explained the event was divided into two sessions, each attended by over 300 teachers. The morning and afternoon sessions occurred at the High Country Conference Center, which offered a professional and collaborative atmosphere. The sessions were not just lectures but interactive workshops where teachers learned new strategies, tried them out, and discussed ways to implement them in their classrooms.

"It wasn't just listening to a great speaker," Penca remarked. "Our teachers were learning strategies, trying them, and collaborating with partners about how to use them in their classrooms. There was laughing, hugging—it was truly a productive day."

In addition to Dr. Mulligan's training, Assistant Superintendent Lance Huffman and Director of Research and Assessment Mike Vogler led discussions on site-specific

focus areas and the introduction of student data at Sinagua Middle School.

As part of the Project Momentum initiative, FUSD is prioritizing the development of Effective Teacher Teams through Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) and delivering high-quality Tier 1 instruction to support student learning. This collaborative effort will continue to evolve throughout the school year, with additional follow-up training planned for September.

"We're really focused on increasing our rate of progress and improving our students' learning in EnglishLanguage Arts and mathematics," Superintendent Penca said.

The tools and strategies Dr. Mulligan shared will help FUSD ensure that students are thinking critically, engaging deeply with content, and meeting the high standards they will be tested on. This will help all learners gain the confidence and skills needed to pursue their chosen paths.

The success of the August 2 training sets the stage for future professional development opportunities within FUSD, demonstrating the district's dedication to continuous growth and improved outcomes for all students. 4


