# Marshall Students Shine at Annual Suzuki Violin Performance

May 6, 2025

Earlier this month, downtown Flagstaff was filled with the joyful sounds of violins as 170 Kindergarten, first-, and secondgrade students from Marshall Magnet Elementary School performed in the school's Annual Suzuki Violin Concert. The event, held on May 8, 2025, at Heritage Square, celebrated the musical accomplishments of the school's youngest learners and marked the 25th year of this beloved tradition.

Dressed in a vibrant sea of Marshall-blue T-shirts, students showcased the skills they've developed through Marshall's unique in-school Suzuki violin program, which provides all K-2 students with two 30-minute lessons each week. Each student is assigned their own violin, fostering a strong sense of responsibility and pride in their progress.

Marshall Magnet Elementary, a K–5 Title I arts and science magnet



school, continues to offer robust enrichment opportunities through its "Magnet Monday" program for students in grades 3–5. Electives include Lego Robotics, Ballet Folklorico, Garden Club, Disc Golf, Advanced Suzuki Violin, and more—providing students with diverse and engaging learning experiences at no cost to families.





This exciting event showcased the power of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). As a proud sponsor and partner, the Flagstaff Unified School District (FUSD) helped bring this interactive and inspiring day to life.

This year's celebration was especially significant, marking the first-ever collaboration with the Lunar Legacy Invitational. The event welcomed robotics teams from across the Southwest who competed in space-themed challenges and live demonstrations, honoring Flagstaff's legacy in lunar and planetary science.

The STEM Celebration continues to serve as a unique opportunity for attendees of all ages to engage in hands-on exhibits, meet professionals in STEM careers, and

health needs across grade levels. One stop that stood out for Stone was at Flagstaff High School, where she witnessed the incredible efforts of the nurse working with medically fragile students.

"That nurse is doing amazing things," said Stone. "It takes a high skill level of nursing to be able to care for not only one but nine children with high-level needs."

After her morning visits, she joined Superintendent Michael Penca for lunch before returning to the district office to attend the regularly scheduled Superintendent's Cabinet meeting. There, Stone participated in discussions ranging from department updates to Governing Board planning. She also had the opportunity to meet with FUSD Governing Board President Erik Sather to review board agenda items and learn more about board leadership.

Throughout the day, Stone was welcomed as the acting superintendent, asked for input, and given a glimpse into the scope of responsibilities that come with leading a school district.

"Everyone was very welcoming—just calling me the

superintendent, introducing me as the superintendent, having me sit in his office and chair, and asking my opinion on things—it was all very flattering and warming," she shared.

Stone, who has been with FUSD for three years, brings a wealth of healthcare experience to her current role. She holds degrees in social work and public health, and later earned her nursing credentials along with a recent certification in school nursing. Just one day before stepping into the superintendent role, she was honored as the Arizona School Nurse of the Year.

"It really showed me the broader picture of how every department's work impacts students—and how our work as school nurses impacts them in return," she said as she reflected on her experience.

Superintendent Penca, who had shadowed Stone at Puente de Hózhó the day prior, expressed deep appreciation for her leadership and care.

"It was a privilege to learn from Nurse Stone," said Penca. "Her dedication to student well-being reflects the best of who we are as a district."

With a smile, Stone concluded the experience by saying, "I'll give Mr. Penca his job back tomorrow."

## FHS Hosts School Participatory Budgeting Vote Day

May 1, 2025

Flagstaff High School hosted a School Participatory Budgeting (SPB) Vote Day on May 2, 2025, providing students with a hands-on experience in civic engagement and collaborative decision-making. The event took place in the FHS Commons and was organized in partnership with the Coconino County Elections Office, with guidance from the Center for the Future of Arizona.

SPB Vote Day provided students with the opportunity to vote on actual campus improvement proposals developed through student surveys and feedback. This year's ballot included four project options:

- Resurface the tennis courts and add pickleball lines for shared student
- Add new student lounge furniture with built-in charging ports near the library and commons
- Upgrade locker rooms with mirrors, shelving, improved showers, air fresheners, and free sanitary products
- Repair and update broken bathroom stalls throughout campus

The event also featured civic engagement tables hosted by the Coconino County Recorder's Office, Arizona Student Association,



RAZE Leadership, and the Center for the Future of Arizona. These organizations shared nonpartisan resources and information about voter registration, civic participation, and student-led advocacy.

Voting booths and official-style ballots were provided by the Elections Department, simulating an authentic voting experience

## Coconino High School Softball Team Wins First-Ever 4A State Championship

The Coconino High School Panthers Softball Team made school history on May 17, 2025, by winning the 4A Conference State Championship for the first time. The Panthers defeated Salpointe Catholic 2–1 in an extrainnings thriller at Arizona State University's Farrington Stadium in Tempe.

After seven scoreless innings, Salpointe broke through with a run in the top of the eighth. Coconino responded with determination and composure. Seniors Danica Kern, Sophie Monsman, Destiny Villas, Kaitlyn Tso, and Aryanna Dominguez played key roles in the comeback. The winning moment came when junior Katelynn Yazzie delivered a walk-off single to right field, scoring the game-winning run and sealing the Panthers' historic victory.

Pitcher Kaitlyn Tso led the

defensive effort with 11 strikeouts over eight innings. Destiny Villas recorded three hits, and solid contributions came from Kern, Tso, Dominguez, and others. Senior Mia Pozar made several critical plays in right field to stop Salpointe scoring threats and keep Coconino in the game.

The championship marks a milestone achievement for the Panthers softball program, capping off a strong season defined by resilience, teamwork, and competitive spirit. Coconino High School recognized the team's success with a school-wide assembly on May 19.

Carpool.School helps families connect with others at their school to coordinate shared transportation. Whether you're looking for help with morning drop-offs, afternoon pickups, or managing busy extracurricular schedules, the app offers a convenient and secure solution.

Benefits of joining the carpool program include: Reducing traffic congestion and lowering environmental impact; Saving time and money by sharing rides; Streamlining complex daily routines; and Building community connections among families.

This recognition honors her exceptional contributions to the Seeds of Stewardship program and her commitment to outdoor education.

Nadège was surprised with the award during a recent three-day camping trip to the Grand Canyon with her students. Through her partnership with the Arizona Trail Association, she uses outdoor experiences to enrich English language learning. Her classes explore the Arizona Trail to build vocabulary, environmental awareness, and a deeper connection to the land and their community.

The Seeds of Stewardship program empowers students to experience public lands firsthand, fostering a sense of place and inspiring stewardship. Nadège's

creative integration of the Arizona Trail into her teaching has provided meaningful learning opportunities for English learners, helping them build confidence and develop a stronger bond with the Northern Arizona landscape.

Over the past two years, her work has gained national and international attention. The partnership between Coconino High School and Seeds of Stewardship has been featured at major gatherings, including the Bureau of Land Management's National Training Symposium, the National Trails Workshop, the Summit for Arizona Trails, and the International Trail Summit.
